 - **Natural Disasters**: Spain is generally safe, but be aware of regional risks like wildfires in summer or flooding in winter months.

Local Laws and Etiquette

1. Cultural Sensitivity

- Public displays of affection are generally acceptable, but be mindful of your surroundings in more conservative areas.

Getting Around

1. Public Transportation

- Metro and Trains: Major cities like Madrid and Barcelona have extensive metro systems. High-speed trains (AVE) connect major cities, making travel efficient and comfortable.
- Buses: Long-distance buses are available and can be a cost-effective way to explore regions not covered by train.
- **Taxis**: Official taxis are widely available and can be hailed on the street or booked through apps. Always ensure the meter is running.

2. Domestic Flights

• For longer distances, domestic flights are available, connecting islands and major cities. Airlines like **Iberia** and **Vueling** offer regular services.

3. Driving in Spain

- An International Driving Permit (IDP) is recommended if you plan to drive in Spain. Roads are generally in good condition, but be cautious of traffic in urban areas.
- **Parking**: Parking can be challenging in city centers. Look for designated parking areas, as fines for illegal parking can be steep.
