- EU citizens may need private health insurance, as the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) is not valid in Türkiye.

2. Vaccinations and Health Precautions

- No specific vaccinations are required for entry, but ensure routine vaccinations are up to date.
- Türkiye is generally free from serious health risks, but travelers should be cautious about drinking tap water in rural areas and opt for bottled water instead.

3. Safety Tips

- Türkiye is considered safe for tourists, but like any travel destination, take precautions against pickpocketing, especially in crowded areas and tourist hotspots.
- o Keep valuables secure and avoid demonstrations or political gatherings.

Local Laws and Etiquette

1. Dress Code

 Türkiye is a secular country, but certain regions, especially rural and religious areas, may have conservative dress expectations. In mosques, visitors should cover their shoulders and knees, and women may be required to cover their heads.

2. Respecting Religious Practices

- If visiting mosques, be respectful of prayer times and follow mosque etiquette such as removing your shoes before entering.
- During Ramadan, it's respectful to avoid eating or drinking in public places during daylight hours, especially in conservative areas.

3. Public Behavior

- Public displays of affection should be kept minimal, especially in more traditional parts of the country.
- Drinking alcohol is legal in most parts of Türkiye, but it is advised to do so in designated areas like bars or restaurants.

Getting Around

1. Public Transportation

- Buses and Trams: Public transportation is reliable, especially in major cities like Istanbul and Ankara. The Istanbulkart is a reloadable card for buses, trams, and ferries.
- Taxis: Available throughout cities, but ensure they use a meter. Ridehailing apps like BiTaksi or Uber are also an option in certain cities.

2. Domestic Flights

 Türkiye is a large country, and flying between major cities is a quick and efficient option. Airlines such as **Turkish Airlines** and **Pegasus** offer domestic routes.

3. Car Rentals

 Car rentals are available, but be mindful of local driving customs. In rural areas, roads can be less well-maintained. Drive on the right-hand side of the road.
